

OTHER COLONSAY MEN WHO SERVED IN WW1

1. Edward Brown – Royal Artillery. Served in Egypt and Palestine.
2. Malcolm Brown – Seaman involved in transport duties.

According to The Oban Times, both men were elder brothers of Able Seaman Angus Brown RN and thus sons of Jasper Brown and Jessie Campbell of Kilchattan. All related to May MacKinnon. Presumably Edward and Malcolm both survived.

3. The full photo I have of 2nd Lt. RHP Howard includes 2 other men – presumably his brothers but I don't know who they are, who they served with or what happened to them - Alex would probably know as he found the original photo for me.
4. Sgt Hugh Buie had a brother Hector who also served with the Canadian Infantry and was twice wounded but survived, according to the obituary for Hugh in The Oban Times.
5. Donald Clark – elder brother of Pte John Clark. He was at sea during WW1 and survived – later to become the captain of the SS Dunara Castle which served the Western Isles and I believe was involved in the evacuation of St Kilda. From The Oban Times and also John and Dianne Clark.
6. Pte John McLellan – born on Colonsay but moved to Kilmartin. He had a younger brother named Duncan who also fought with the A&S Highlanders. He was killed on 21 March 1918 and is commemorated on the Poziers Memorial. Unlike John he is not on the Colonsay Memorial so presumably he was born after the family moved.
7. Alexander [Sandy] McAllister and Duncan McDonald [gamekeeper on Colonsay]. Both, according to Donald Gibbie's brother Duncan, served on the same ship in the RN as Deck Hand Angus McPhee. Another Colonsay native mentioned in The Oban Times as serving with Alexander McAllister was Malcolm McNeill. All 3 survived as far as I know.
8. Captain Angus Campbell RAMC. Born on Colonsay but left to work as a GP in England and brother of Mr Campbell of Kiloran Farm. Mentioned in dispatches and presumably survived. Per The Oban Times.
